



One day

On Sunday, February 4 about 3000 volunteers took part in our Volunteers for Seniors Day. They visited single elderly living in public

housing estates and also those in an elderly home. Some of them cleaned homes, others, performed simple assessments to check for early signs of dementia, and others helped some of the elderly to have their wishes come true.

We have organized this outreach day each of the past 22 years. Besides boasting about the number of hours clocked and elderly served, what more can be said about this day's impact? Here are two stories that remind us not to underestimate the power of one day.

There is power in one day of service, when nearly three thousand gathered to serve together.

One encounter

Jessica Yuen, her husband and their two young boys signed up to visit the elderly home on this day. To break the ice and add to the festive Chinese New Year air, they brought along ink, brushes, and red paper to write traditional holiday greetings for the residents. At the home they were drawn to one elderly man, who had used to run his own dim sum restaurant. Menus for such restaurants were always written using brush pens, and Jessica knew this man would have beautiful brush pen writing, so she asked him if he would write something for them.





"The old man hesitated for a moment, then with shaky hands picked up the brush. He took a deep breath, placed the brush on the paper and wrote the words 'BLESSING' and 'LUCK' for us. His hesitant look suddenly turned to a satisfied smile.

He then asked for another piece of red paper. This time, he wrote, 'SERVICE TO OTHERS'.

I thanked him repeatedly. Later, I took his masterpiece and showed it off to all the other volunteers.

This was the the most precious gift I received in all my years as a volunteer.

The very next day, we received news from the social worker at the home that the elderly man had gone to the hospital that morning. He passed away a few hours later. When his wife and son came to collect his belongings, they asked the social worker to let the volunteers know they had brought great joy and happiness to their husband and father on his last day on earth.

Upon hearing the news of the elderly man passing away, Jessica reflected, "When he wrote 'SERVICE TO OTHERS', I felt he was expressing his gratitude more than trying to lecture us. The way he wrote those words, it was as if he was remembering his younger days and all his contribution to his family and children."

The volunteers made this grandma feel so loved and cared for that she insisted they hold hands for the photo. Volunteers introduced our dental centre to this grandma. One of the centre's services is to help needy elderly like her get free dental care.



One visit

Ashley Leong and her group visited a seventy-three year-old single elderly woman in one of the public housing estates. In the course of conversation, volunteers learned about some of the difficulties this elderly woman was facing.

"She had dentures fitted at a private dental clinic. However, she told us that they did not fit well. They hurt when she ate. She went back several times to have them adjusted but to no avail.

Finally she took out several thousand dollars from her own savings and went to a another clinic to have a new set fitted. This was a lot of money to shell out for someone on public assistance. But the new dentures gave her problems, too. She was about to lose hope of being able to eat normally again.

We knew that HOPE worldwide recently opened two social enterprise dental centres to serve the community and help someone like her. So we gave her the number and encouraged her to call. She couldn't believe such a place existed and was so excited."

We did in fact receive the call from the elderly woman before Chinese New Year. An appointment has been set up for her to be seen by one of our experienced dental consultants in the near future.

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"Walk the Extra Mile" - a service in which volunteers help the elderly fulfill wishes. This elderly man wanted glasses fitted. A seemingly simple wish fulfilled rekindled his hope of continuing to live independently.
